

PASTOR'S CORNER

"He came to his senses..." (Luke 15:17)

This story from Jesus is so important because it offers us the clearest window into the character of our heavenly Father, the trouble we have gotten ourselves into, and what it means to be "saved." Sadly, many in the church have "lost" the true concept of what it means to be "saved." Popular notions center on us needing "salvation" from some "after-life" fate.

But Jesus's framework is very different. Jesus understands that we need to be saved from ourselves (our hearts), our current lifestyles (our habits), and our social cityettens (our habits). This is a (our habits), and our social situations (our habitats). This is a present moment, very present moment, today-centered, political, and economic issue. We don't primarily need to be saved from the "after-life" (the "after-life" is just an extension of now), we need to be saved from life as we currently live and experience it. Therefore, we are either like the younger son or the older son in the story. Both are lost and both have story. Both are lost and both have wandered from their Father.

The younger son becomes lost by completely leaving his Father's house in order to pursue life on his own terms and to chase his own dreams. He greedily takes what he thinks belongs to him and tries to make it on his own. But he


Jesus's parable and story in Luke 15 is one of the most famous, but also most important stories, in the whole of the Scriptures. It is usually and popularly called the story of the "prodigal son." But I think calling it the story of "the lost sons" is far better. Both sons in the story are lost and both need to be "saved."

eventually realizes (while he is alive, not in any after-life!) that everything he has chosen for himself is a dead-end. He realizes that being autonomous and self-sufficient and lord of his own life does not and the world around him) is a living the choices for living are also a living cannot work. He realizes his habitat (the world around him) is a living hell. He realizes his habits (his choices for living) are also a living hell. He finally realizes his heart (his impulses and desires) are also a living hell. It is in these realizations that he "comes to his senses." He suddenly wakes up to seeing his life as it really is. And so he tucks his tail and comes home to his Father. and comes home to his Father.

> The older son has also wandered from his Father's house, but has done from his Father's house, but has done it in a much more subtle way. The older son has stayed superficially within the fold, but we find out that he has cut himself off from the Father by his competitive, greedy, and unforgiving heart. His heart has created habits that now drive him from the habitat of his Father's home at the end of the story. The story ends with the Father begging the older son to come back home. But, hauntingly, we are never told if the older son ever "comes to his senses."

> This is a very powerful, moving, and challenging story. We need saving, not in the after-life, but TODAY. We not in the after-life, but TODAY. We need saving from our hearts, habits, and habitats. We have all wandered from the Lord, one way or another, and Jesus is begging us to wake up and "come to our senses." We do indeed need saving from hell, but hell is right now, all around us and within us, if we are not careful.

So in the meantime we continue to nurture and shape God's land at the Disciple Garden. We are especially looking forward to a large youth group of volunteers that will be helping us this month.



Community Ministry Corner

There are so many tricks of the trade for the reading teacher, and likewise faithful Bible reading and living. Reading between the lines (and lives of people) takes much humility and practice.

Of first importance is always being present, in the present, allowing God to speak to you. He invites you to read about His Son's life in human flesh first through the literal walk and words of Jesus. But he also invites you to see this truth of Jesus in bodily flesh and blood in the entirety of the Bible's texts--Jesus's truth is passed on, in and through those willing to read and live between the lines. God gives peace, HIS Peace. This is NOT as the world/man gives us, for the ways of the world/man literally and spiritually limit the living Word of God (though unsuccessfully).

When we learn to read a language it requires baby steps. "Reading" is learning our letters, our sounds and consonant blends, our sight words, and using the pictures within stories as clues as to this foreign language (even though it is our native tongue!). Once we have enough practice and mastery at these stumbling steps, then we can turn our focus into fluent reading (orally and silently) and the complex multi-tasking (which is an impossibility for humanity) of comprehending as we read. This process (and all practice into productive peace-filled understanding, performance, imagination, and creativity) has a deeper level yet: INFERENCE, analysis, synthesis. Can you read between the words and between the lines for deeper comprehension and connection and contemplation? This inference is a deeper transcendence in understanding of how to communicate human ideas through our language. Inference can emerge through modeling, practice, and support. The same, and even much deeper truths, also lie within the Father's Bible words, meanings, and metaphors. In comprehension, extension, and inference we find the mystery and truth of God's will and light. Jesus reveals his narrow way in the flesh, in riddles, and as he is ridiculously patient in explanation. We find his grace and mercy when we settle in rightly--completely humble, broken, vulnerable, desperate, and eager--at His feet.

There at Jesus's feet is where mustard seed faith can start for us. There as we seek, find, and share His peace that man cannot give, nor understand. We come to understand His peace only through the compassion and commitment HE offers in relationship. We must recognize our need and the only certainty--there is no other way under heaven by which a man can, or would want to, be saved. So that's where we start. We start again with a basic foundation of prioritizing our individual and collective relationship with God the Father as the head, His Son in resurrected faithful flesh, and His Spirit waiting in the wind for us to become more than a babbling, temperamental infant of the faith.

So I invite you to consider joining Marie, Sonia, and me in being church readers of our weekly Old Testament and Epistle readings. This practice and discipline has completely changed me and is starting to reveal His and my deeper inner truths. Biblehub.com is also a tremendous resource to delve into confusing wordings and possible meanings from Matthew Henry and assorted others commentaries. And with this as a base of learning the basics, we can begin again to delve into the tricky and sticky communication and life of living with our fellow brothers and sisters in Christ. God help(s) us.


