Things are getting close. The asphalt driveway is finished and the concrete transition to 10th Street is set to be poured in early July. The retaining walls are finished and back-filled. The pond liner for the top of the building, which will help keep water away, is in place. A second buried drain line leading away from the porch is in place. The landscaping around the building which will help direct surface water is mostly done. The exterior insulation and stucco is mostly done and is set to be finished in early July. The rough-in inspections are done. The doors are on. The HVAC system is ordered. The water heater is installed. The dry wall is going up throughout the building. A sand volleyball pit is dug. A youth group from Ascension Lutheran in Wichita, KS, came for a few days and helped with all sorts of projects around the Disciple Garden. Only the Lord knows when all this will finally come together and when final inspections and occupancy will be granted, but we are incredibly thankful to be so close after such a long journey. Continue to pray for the development and please consider how you might be part of the Disciple Garden ministry in the days ahead.



Community Ministry Corner

Lisa, Morgan, and Grandma Sara, and maybe others in our family, have really enjoyed a series on NetFlix (PBS) titled Call the Midwife. The wholesomeness and realness of midwives, nuns, nurses and doctors in England in the 50's and 60's exposes a wide array of anything that can and will go wrong (or right)...will, with the wild and wooly life of pregnancy, human relationships/decisions, and child birth. It is wholesome and beautiful, yet in a better balanced way than most, delves into real relational and personal issues, weighing the right or wrong, good or evil, ethical or awry, hopefully avoiding agenda pushing or superiority complexes. This, in my naive, unstudied opinion, was an earlier time, when hospitals were created and served by the church and more raw, and the money and business monsters were far from the reach and agenda of people striving to dedicate their lives to God and healthcare for humanity.

You know I like to soak in audio books. And what they hit on seems to line up with the one thing, among many beautiful and beautifully presented scenarios, progressions, and resolutions in the English child birthing industry of the 50's...and in each generation and iteration of why the world and people are beautiful and good and work.

Oh. The humanity... the solution? or the problem?... if you listen to my processings/rants, when I'm willing to share, you know I view you and me fairly critically. I have my deepest belief in faith in God....and humanity is part of that plan, but I just can't help thinking, believing, seeing, and hearing how we elevate ourselves a bit above our pay grade and place naively at best, intentionally, arrogantly, and ruthlessly at worst, in the role and hierarchy of God, creation, and His will being done rightly on earth. What doesn't quite jive for me are the smiley, happy people. Shocker I know...

The rantings and ravings of the great minds of the communities of 100's and 1000's of years ago speak to the overstep of humanism and sophism. And while I may be off, maybe completely off, and definitely need to look up

the definitions and examples of these words and movements, I sense they speak to what is off kilter with me for this TV series, and human processings in every iteration and generation and mix. While there is beauty and beautiful intent in man potentially, it is not man that makes things great, or great again—eh 'merica. It is not society, individually or collectively, that makes God's will be done on earth, unless God is directing it and we continue to serve and submit, and maybe study it. So as you've read in my posts the past year, an endearing gaze or a captivating smile does not make the world go round or make everything alright, to me, it clearly muddles the Master's message and mastery.

So I may not have the right words or detailed enough dissertation. And yet I'm willing to put myself out there, in moderation, for different discussions among our version of God's faithful humanity, as to what is right and wrong in the world of God's doing. He ALWAYS trumps do-gooding (and anything less), and ALWAYS prevails, even through and in spite of humanity's constant spin on our goodness, greatness, innocence, or blessedness (which does terrible distraction, misdirection, and damage to clarity and the momentum of what God's will could be accomplishing, if we minded our place and mouths, minds and hearts, as the most powerful part of creation). To God be the glory as we live like the nuns, nurses, and doctors of Call the Midwife, as following the will of God and giving the glory rightly, to Him alone. Let us serve and contribute passionately, while humbly, as a small piece of his beautifully intertwining creation. If we will allow it. But remember, don't be deceived or deceiving—His will is accomplished whether we get on board or not.
